5.0 Coast Community Health	Hollie Strahm introduced herself as being born a raised in Curry County. She is a nurse by trade with a master's in social work and currently serves as the COO of Coast Community Health. Hollie provided us with an overview of Coast Community Health's new project the North Curry County Health &
	Wellness Center, which would involve: A more holistic model of food, education and healthcare.



	Project significance: - The hope is to create a long term positive impact and sustainable change in the community. Hollie discussed the following: - Measuring Systemic Change - Building Modular design Umpqua Bank building was gifted to Coast and will be used as a pharmacy, and will also offer mental health services Stephani Pollizi asked if Coast would be hiring a registered dietician and stressed the importance for the county to have this.	
6.0 Finding Hope- Suicide Prevention Project	Gordon Clay presented us with the disheartening statistics of suicide rates amongst community members of all ages in Curry County. - Gordon hopes to get his publication into each home in Coos and Curry County by Septembersuicide prevention month. - Gordon is looking for a minimum of 240 individuals, businesses and organizations to donate \$50 in order to show their support of mental health support for our neighbors and community. - United Way of SW Oregon will receive all the charitable donations and help ensure the projects reaches its goal. They will receive 10% off the top to support Finding Hope.	
	 Connie Atwood made a motion for the CAC to approve Advanced Health's sponsorship of \$6,050 to sponsor Finding Hope out of our CHIP Prevention & Services budget. Sharon seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.
