4.0 Advanced Health updates	Updates from Curry County: Curry Advanced Health donated funds to Curry CASA to help buy silent auction prizes for their yearly CASA event Curry Advanced Health donated funds to the Curry Homeless Coalition for their Resource Center Open House scheduled May 02 We had a good turnout for our monthly Curry Case Management meeting which we held at the CCH Club House Maggie and Jessie did a lunch with North Bend Medical Center Gold Beach updating the providers and MAs on policies Maggie attended the Curry APD meeting to update them on our services and benefits for dual eligible members Bonnie Ell provided updates on the following: Bonnie reminded everyone of the new name for the Coos-Curry Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) initiative, 'South Coast Together', and that they have a new ACE Connections community site platform to use to connect community members in this work from across the country and locally, and also to share upcoming events related to this work. Bonnie encouraged everyone to sign up at: https://www.acesconnection.com/g/southcoasttogether Bonnie also let everyone know that the Every Child (statewide initiative and community based wrap-around program to support foster children, foster parents and DHS workers) Curry County has formed a steering committee and meets monthly on the 3rd Thursday of the month from 12:00-1:00 pm at Wild River Pizza. Laura Williams elaborated on the work of South Coast Together and announced the opportunity for more local community members to be trained as ACE presenters as well as the opportunity to become an ACE Master Trainer in Atlanta in June. 	would be \$3,000 plus the cost of travel and meals. Heather Baumer- spoke about the Family Café happening in Port Orford on April 25, 2019 and that the Café and topic are happening as a result of surveys and data collected from the Port Orford school district. Mellanie Caldera presented on Oasis Shelter Home's 2018 year in review: - 511 (times a child stayed overnight at the shelter) - 43 (average number of nights stayed in shelter) - 129 (returned to stay in shelter again)	
	 3,907 (calls to the shelter: 205 sexual assault, 1,811 domestic violence, 46 stalking, 227 non emergency) 3,839 (total bed nights) 330 (nights a pet stayed overnight) 271 (Christmas program) Mellanie also reported that bus service is providing transport to/from school for children at the shelter. 	
5.0 Oasis Shelter Home	Mellanie also mentioned that all of their calls are taken and fielded here in Curry county. She also mentioned that their intake process and work with medical and law enforcement is now completely streamlined. Mellanie noted they have Survivor Support Groups & Workshops in both Gold Beach and Brookings. For more

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donations for Gordon's Finding Hope suicide prevention project. Gordon is looking for:

- Advanced Health to write a check for \$50 to be on the publication.
- For individual members and visitors who attend Advanced Health meetings to show their desire to reduce suicides in our counties by writing an individual check for \$50 to be on the back cover so that people will see their name, open up a recognition that they were in the magazine and thereby generate more people talking about suicide awareness and prevention and breaking the stigma so that those in crisis feel safer coming out to someone about the fact that they are in crisis.

Beth Barker-Hidalgo announced the open house of the new Resource Center in Gold Beach on May 2nd from 10 am- 4 pm. On behalf of Michele Fritch, Beth announced the meeting for the Grace Project (retreat planning for foster children), will take place on May 2nd at 4 pm in the Blue Room in Gold Beach.

Heather Baumer distributed flyers regarding the statewide early learning system plan, as well as the roles of the SCREL (South Coast Regional Early Learning) Hub and their roles and responsibilities. Heather explained that the Family Café taking place in Port Orford was in response to collected and analyzed regional data and their goals are to help address specific needs of targeted priority populations within their community. Below are the targeted populations adopted by their SCREL Hub steering committee on March 5, 2019:

- Children in Foster Care, and their families
- Children who are victims of abuse and neglect
- Children and families who are homeless or have unstable housing
- Children with disabilities
- Children and parents that are English Language Learners
- Children with racial and/or ethnic minority status
- Economically disadvantaged children and families
- Pregnant moms and young children, birth to three
