	Financial Report & CHIP grant reports		
	We have \$112,500 in our chip grants for this year,		
	and we have not opened applications yet.		
	We are starting to get back our 6-month reports.		
	There was one organization that received a grant		
	but did not receive payment and that error was		
	found and corrected.		
	Question regarding SHARE initiative funding from a		
	previous mating. It is separate from the CHIP and is		
	money that is set aside from the previous year's		
	profit. This portion was set aside for housing. It		
	was on the agenda several times during the last 1.5		
	years. The community advisory council has a role in		
	making recommendations to the board on how it		
	should be spent. It was sent to the board and		
	approved and is now with OHA for their approval.

The suggestion box is now a link. Listed above and sent in previous email. We received a suggestion last month. Suggestion: Trauma mitigation tools are affordable. We need a weekend retreat with SCT. Discussion regarding how many people in the group would participate in this type of training and the proper amount of time to schedule. A suggestion was made to look at doing an evening training for a CAC meeting and offered that to the community. A suggestion that perhaps resiliency training is a better fit if most people in this group have already taken ACES. Emergency snap allotments ended last month. There are still pandemic EBT allotments that will be being issued for each child. Approx. 389,000 children in Oregon. They will receive approximately \$381 a month. We are at the end of public health emergency unwind. For redetermination it is important to keep contact information up to date. For long term care individuals their case workers will work with them specifically on what they can do to maintain their eligibility. If they are unable to do so we provide resources and support to make sure they have a plan and know their choices. Over the years I suggested the CAC receive Different reports like charts and graphs. It would be nice to see what is happening from month to month. WE have been preparing for an increase we are	Action	
expecting from the decrease in SNAP benefits. Yesterday CHIP funds were used in a vital way		
when a person needed to get onto Medicare. She		
had 80\$ worth of prescriptions she needed to pick		
up for wound care and CHIP funds allowed us to		
pay for the very vital prescriptions. Funds were also		
used for her transportation to and from the		
medical center. We also provide sleeping bags,		
tents and tarps that were purchased with CHIP		
funds. We do have people do volunteer work within their means in exchange for those items.		
Sometimes we have individuals need clothing and		
we don't have the correct size in our donations and		
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we are able to go purchase clothing. This meets a basic need and makes a big difference. Clean dry clothing and getting their clothes back clean and dry is impactful. On May 7th, we saw 88 people during the day. The peek number in one day was 99 people in the last 90 days. The CHIP funding helps with laundry and maintenance to the machines. CHIP funding makes a huge difference to our vulnerable population. Question: how did the pallet homes hold up over the winter? We are very pleased how they have held up. The biggest problem is they are situated in a low-lying area and sometimes there is standing water in the area but there has not been any leaking. The power bill increases but they are heated and warm. The warming center has been open 78 nights which is double what a normal season looks like.		
The duties of the council include: 1. Finding and supporting preventive care practices by Advanced Health - Clearify 2. Oversees Advanced Health's development of a Community Health Assessment (CHA) 3. Adopt a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) based on the CHA 4. Yearly publish a CHIP Progress Report 5. Have a role in looking at Social Determinants of Health and Equity (SDOH-E). Keeping the cost under the Supporting Health for All through RE-investment (SHARE) Initiative 6. The CAC Helps decide how Health-Related Services (HRS) invests in the community. 7. Offer helpful information to Advanced Health 8. Help Advanced Health with special projects as asked. We need to update and approve our council charter. Discussion regarding developing the CHA and how it is worded in the charter vs the contract. Looking at these duties is the first step of this.
